


Site of Cricket Ground, Hawthorn Road 1880,s

Some of the opponents were; Rainhill Hospital, Bon Marche, (a department store) Tranmere, Ince Blundell.

When I produced the book in 1991 the title was a tribute to the late Ben Scanlon. This time it's a tribute to the late Bob Draper and is one of his many sayings, of which, there are so many a book could be filled with them alone.

3rd March 1920. Bag money for the 1st and 2nd elevens was to be increased to 2/-The bag money was for the horse and cart to take the cricket bags to away grounds. Players went on the train.

The roof of the Stable was to be repaired.

The Groundsman's wages was increased to 3 Guinea's £3.15p.

The Scorers were paid 15/- for the season 75p. That's about £57 now

When I joined the cricket club in 1972. There was a picture on the stairs in the old pavilion of F. W. Baucher. Fred Baucher played for Lancashire. He was born in Wigan in 1878 and died in Blundellsands in 1947. He also played for Bootle for a number of years. When I asked about him from some of the old players who had played with him. I was told "He was the greatest wicket-keeper ever and when he played for Bootle people came from all over Lancashire and beyond to watch him play.". I don't know what happened to the picture but I can't find it.

### THE LIVERPOOL COMPETITION

The clubs met as early as 1850, perhaps even earlier. There were 11 clubs:

The Original 11 Clubs were: Birkenhead Park, Bootle, Formby, Huyton, Liverpool, New Brighton, Northern, Ormskirk, Oxton, Rock Ferry, and Sefton.

It was not until 1892 that the Liverpool Echo published an unofficial weekly league table. Calling it the Liverpool Competition. At this time clubs could play each other more than twice. Or not at all. For instance, Birkenhead Park refused to play Bootle because of an incident in a match at Birkenhead Park. Which continued until the fixtures were standardised in 1949 with 16 teams. And the league became; The Liverpool and District Cricket Competition. Preston CC were one of the 16 teams but left in 1952 and were replaced by St Helens Recs.

In 1996 it was decided to increase the number of teams in the league. At the end of the 1997 season 4 of the original 16 teams left to join the Cheshire League. They were: Birkenhead Park, Chester Boughton Hall, Neston, and Oxton. The Clubs that joined at this time were: Bolton, Colwyn Bay, Leigh, Marchwiel, Newton-le-Willows, Northop Hall, Wigan and Worsley.

Bolton, Marchwiel, and Worsley left at the end of the 1998 season

In 1999 a two division structure was introduced. A year later In 2000 the 1st eleven premier division was awarded ECB Premier League status.

The Club was founded in 1833. Bootle Cricket Club is the second oldest Club in Lancashire and Merseyside only Liverpool 1807 is older. In 1833 it's possible some of our members could have been at the Battle of Waterloo (1815) or even Trafalgar (1805)

We know the foundation date of the Club, because of a speech made by the Mayor of Bootle Mr James Webster JP in December 1883. He made the speech at the opening of the Clubs Bazaar held to raise money for a new cricket pavilion and to lay out the ground. He says he was delighted to be involved in a project that was to maintain one of the oldest institutions in Bootle. He went on to say that the Club was established in 1833.

This is the only information we have of the early years of the Club. We do know also from the speech that Wadham Road is the 4th ground that the Club has occupied. Firstly at a ground at the back of what was called Richmond Vale. This became to small for them and they sought new premises. After some time, Mr Michael Ashcroft, a farmer of Bank Hall Fields, offered them some land, This was situated near what is now Kirkdale Station. They had to leave this ground to make room for the Lancashire & Yorkshire Railway. They then came to what is now called the old cricket ground in Strand Road. Situated where the fire station used to be.

The club held this ground from Lord Derby until it was required for business purposes. They had however seen a admirable site in another part of the town, The Club now had 8 acres at Hawthorn Road. The ground opened for the 1884 season. Most of this information comes from The Bootle Times 14th December 1883. The Mayor thanked Mr Parker for suppling the information. The piece on the next page was printed in a club handbook published in 1950.

### A SHORT HISTORY OF BOOTLE CRICKET CLUB

We can say with some accuracy that the club was established in 1833, although the earliest definite record that we have consists of a ball lettered in gold which was used in a match v. Lord Stanley's XI at Knowsley in 1858. The ground in those days stood on the site of the Fire Station, on the corner of Strand Road and Irlam Road, going down to Rimrose Road. This was long before Alexandra Dock was built, and there was a lovely view across the river. An old ships cabin was purchased and a decent front added for the purpose of a dressing room, which was used until a brick pavilion was erected about 1867. In 1851, G Hampshire joined the club, and he was the first to introduce round-arm bowling in the Liverpool district, whilst by 1860 the Club had a membership of 55, of which half resided in the east and south-ends of Liverpool. As early as August 31st, September 1st and 2nd 1865, an All England Touring XI played 22 of Bootle and District and proved the victors. The first Australian team which toured England during 1868 played Bootle twice that year and won on each occasion. In this side there were, of course, the Aboriginals, and after the game they entertained the crowd to an exhibition of hurling the boomerang. Throwing the assagai and javelin, a performance which greatly interested the spectators, who came from far and near. In May 1876, there is a record of the United South, including W.G. Grace and his brother E.F., also having played 22 of Bootle and District, a game which the locals won.

The Club moved to it's present site in 1884 and considerable expenses incurred in laying out the ground and building the pavilion, but the cost was guaranteed by several well-known local gentlemen, and at a bazaar held in 1890 the deficit was cleared. The following news item from the "Bootle Times issue of 1883 sums up the position when the new ground was planned:-

"The Bootle Cricket Club is one of the oldest in the county, if not the kingdom, and it has long enjoyed a high reputation for spirited play and fairness of management.

"For upwards of fifty years it has held it has held under Lord Derby, the ground in Irlam Road. On which so many famous matches have been played, and there is said to be in existence a letter by the late Earl of Derby, promising that as long as there are eleven men in Bootle to play cricket, the Club should never be dismissed from the ground.

"The advance of trade in the borough, and especially of the shipping trade, has, however, so enhanced the value of the property, that it has been foreseen for the last three or four years that the ground must ultimately be surrendered. Negotiations for a new ground have been in progress with Mr. Hale, Lord Derby's Agent, but although notice to quit the old ground was given in July, and expired on February 1st, it was not until lately that the Club obtained the offer of a good piece of land in Hawthorn Road on a fourteen years' lease. The land has an area of about 25 acres and the Club was offered either the whole or part. For themselves, they only required eight or ten acres, but as the terms for the whole land are very reasonable, and seeing the advantages which would accrue to the Borough from the preservation of this large open space, the Club placed itself in communication with the corporation and offered it to the Town Council thought well to acquire the whole land as public recreation ground, to become their tenants for the portion required by the Club.

"This arrangement has been approved in committee and looking to the growing population and the rapidity with which every open space is being covered with bricks and mortar, we should suppose that it will be unanimously confirmed at the next meeting of the council.

"Meanwhile, the Club wants the ground, which it will take in any case prepared for use, The ground is at present under plough. To level, sod, make paths, fence in and build a pavilion will cost not less than £1,400 to £1,500 and towards this outlay the Club asks for public subscriptions. The response so far has been ready and generous, upwards of £420 having been received.

"The scheme includes not only a cricket ground, but lawn tennis grounds, which will be available for ladies, and for which a second pavilion is desired, while the boys of Bootle College will be accommodated on the cricket field."

Note: The short history on the previous page, was from a club "Souvenir Handbook" published in 1950. I found the booklet in a box in the dressing room. It had been put there after the upstairs room in the old pavilion had been cleared out prior to our moving to the new pavilion. I had not seen it before.

The booklet is very much of the 1950's. The grammar, punctuation and language are of the time. I was 13 in 1950 and it surprised me how much English has changed in 70 years.

One person not mentioned in the booklet is W. (Billy) Winspear who most certainly produced it. He was Hon. Secretary of the club from 1947 to 1969. I would also think that he was the author of the 'Short History' Bill kept the club statistics from 1949 to 1969. I have his books.

In the history it says of the club; "The club had been in Irlam Road for upward of 50 years," this was in 1883. It is not correct. We have since learned that the club had two grounds prior to going to Irlam Road. One in Richmond Vale, The other at Bankhall Fields, now the site of or near to Kirkdale Station. The club moved to Irlam or Strand Road as some call it in 1845.

I would like to remember here, all the people who have been involved with Bootle Cricket Club and now Firwood Bootle Cricket Club in what ever capacity for the last 192 years. Without them we wouldn't still be here.

Hopefully we can go forward and continue to flourish.

### **BLAST FROM THE PAST**

In 1865 22 Bootle Players played an all England Eleven at what was the old ground in Strand Road. The match was held over three days 31st August , 1st and 2nd September. There are conflicting reports of the result. Some say England won by 58 runs others that Bootle were bowled out for 58. The England team included W.G. Grace and his brother

It was reported that the club must have been held in great esteem to have awarded such a fixture.

### W G Grace

Played 24 matches for England scoring 1098 runs,. His highest score being 170 against Australia at the Oval in 1886.

### A FFW SNIPS FROM THE PAST

### WHEN BOOTLE PLAYED THE AUSTRALIANS

The Bootle Club which was founded in 1833 has played on the present enclosure at Hawthorn Road since 1884, but few people seem to know that they contested two games against the Aboriginal Australian side of 1868. Bootle Lost each of them: the first by 9 wickets and the second by 154 runs, the ground in those far off days being where the fire station now stands.

At the conclusion of the second game the Aboriginals gave their performances of native pastimes—throwing the boomerang and spear, use of the stock whip Sham fights etc, the like of which will never again be seen in this part of the world.

One of them (Charlie Dumas) was a real genius with the boomerang. He could always be trusted to throw it without any fear of danger to the spectators\*. Away it would go high in the air, almost out of sight and after circling around and pirouetting about in the heavens for almost half-a-minute, It would finally drop at his feet. It was amazingly cleaver and numbers of people came specially to the Bootle ground to see him do this trick.

\*It was reported by a local newspaper at the time. That the boomerang did in fact knock a gentleman spectator's top hat off. And he had to be treated for a cut to his head.

Club Minutes 3rd August 1937 reported gate receipts for the:

Second Eleven Game vs Sefton Park £3 6s this equates to £253.30 today

First Eleven vs Sefton Park £16 this equates to £1343.67 respectively today. It was also stated that the entertainments committee handed the treasurer a cheque for £60 £4,980 to day.

Syd Shepherd took the bowling honours with 45 wickets for 702 runs his best performance was 6-40 vs Northern

The best Match bowling performance of the season was Jimmy Cartwrights 8 for 26 against Neston.

### **Bootle Vs Oxton**

Spectators at the Bootle vs Oxton game at Wadham Road on Saturday blinked in surprise Bootle's skipper Syd Shepherd bowled an over of under arms. This happened during some dull batting in the Oxton innings.

Afterwards Syd explained his action. He told the times. "I was so tired of the way were shaping that I decided to liven things up by tempting them to hit out. I do not think any should bat on after 5 o'clock in this class of cricket and the manner in which the Oxton batsmen were going slow got on my nerves.". Syd went on. "bowling under arm is quite legitimate. I informed the umpire of my intention who in turn told the batsman. "Added Syd with a smile: "Anyway I have always wanted to do this and I rather enjoyed it all." Bootle won the match by 3 wickets. Oxton batted for 63 overs.



A letter had been received from Birkenhead Park stating that they would not continue any fixtures with Bootle Cricket Club.

Arnie Martin Explanation: It seems that the Mayor of Birkenhead came into bat for Park and one or two disparaging remarks were made about his batting by the Bootle slips.

### **BOOTLE TIMES 16 July 1946**

So much wilful damage has been caused to Bootle Cricket Club Property that last night a committee meeting was held to consider whether the club should be wound up. A motion that the club should be closed down forthwith however was withdrawn

A night watchman has been appointed and help will be given by a vigilantes squad.

Minutes 18 July 1946

Mr Wilson raised the question of a new ground. Agreed Mr Wilson and Mr Brown visit Bryant & May and see the ground.

Minutes 17 November 1947

A 45 over knockout Competition had been proposed by the District Clubs To be played over 2 nights.

Minutes 24 January 1949

It was agreed to set up a building fund with a view to erecting new premises in the near future. *I wonder what happened to it?*

Albert Cohen played for the club 1st eleven from 1946. He was appointed captain of the 1st eleven in 1948, and so was our first captain in the Liverpool Competition. He scored a total of 2619 runs and took a 192 wickets for the club. He left at the end of the 1951 season and joined Southport and Birkdale, where he played for a number of years.

### **SEASON SUMMERY 1959**

May 16th At Aighurth: Liverpool 157 all out, Bootle 158 for 6

Two 17 year old all rounders, Ken Snellgrove and John Greenwood, guided Bootle to their fist win over Liverpool at Aigburth for many years. Bootle's senior batsmen had fallen under the spell of off spinner Ken Jones and the score stood uneasily at 101 for 5 when the two youngsters came together with only 34 minutes to go. While Snellgrove cut and swept delightfully. Greenwood hit out impartially at everything that was offered, including a few erratic deliveries from Everton goal-keeper Albert Dunlop. By the time Greenwood was out for 31. The game was all over bar the shouting. Snellgrove who has yet to be dismissed this season hit the winning run. Liverpool Echo Monday 18th May 1959.

It was also reported that this was Ronnie Cockbain's last match for Bootle. He had commenced work at Cammel Lairds and would play for them in the Merseyside Competition. Also that Ken Young would leave at the end of the season to take up a post in Leeds.

### **ALBERT DUNLOP**

The Bootle Times 16th June 1959 reported that Everton goal-keeper Albert Dunlop had joined Bootle and would make his debut at home against Birkenhead Park. The match against Park ended in a draw: Park 220 for 7 dec. Bootle 196 for 6

Albert Dunlop scored 51

### SYD SHEPHERD (Captain)

Syd Shepherd celebrated his 51st birthday taking 4 for 18 against New Brighton. They were all out for 66, Bootle got the runs for 1 wicket. This displaced New Brighton from the top of the league, and ended their 100% home record.

Syd also took 4 wickets against Ormskirk. To take his total Competition wickets since the war to 700 the first in the competition to do so. During this time he also took 150 wickets for Cheshire.

Also reported that 15 year old Sandy Tittershall made his Ormskirk debut against Hightown and scored 74. Hightown were considered the best bowling side in the competition at this time.

### **BOOTLE UMPIRE IN LBW CONTROVERSY**

Man in the limelight at Huyton was Bootle's veteran umpire Harry Brown., who gave Huyton's number 11 batsman, Worsley out leg before wicket to Heyes. When the visitors were only three runs behind. To make matters worse Worsley and many spectators thought he had played the ball. Heyes however thought the ball had struck the bat after it had hit Worsley's pad. (O Dear)

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# Review of "King Willow" in Bootle Over the past 125 years.

### **Bootle Times 1st August 1958**

One hundred and twenty five years of putting bat to ball will be celebrated on Saturday, When Bootle Cricket Club play Birkenhead Park at Wadham Road, to mark the local club's 125th anniversary. It will be a very special day with the Mayor of Bootle (Alderman J. C. Hevey and other prominent citizens attending the match and a celebration dinner which follows.

And the man who leads the team out on this memorable occasion could not be more fitting-skipper Syd Shepherd.

He is one of the great personalities who from time to time filled the ranks of the club in it's many years.

It could be that this 125th anniversary year will be Syd's last as a player with the club. He contemplates retirement.

The Club was established in 1833 although the earliest definite record that there is consists of a ball lettered in gold, which was used in a match vs Lord Salisbury's XI at Knowsley Road. In 1858

The ground in those days stood on the site of the fire station on the corner of Strand Road and Irlam Road and going down to Rimrose Road. This was long before the Alexander Dock was built, and there was a lovely view across the river. An old ships cabin was purchased and a decent front was added for the purpose of a dressing room, which was used until a brick pavilion was erected about 1867.

### Membership of 55

In 1851, G Hampshire joined the club and he was the first to introduce round arm bowling in the Liverpool district, whilst about 1860 the club had a membership of 55, of which half resided in the east and south ends of Liverpool.

As early as August 31st September 1st and 2nd 1865, an All-England Touring Eleven played 22 of Bootle and district and proved the winners.

The first Australian touring team which toured England during 1968 played Bootle twice that year and won on each occasion. In this side there were of course, the Aboriginals, and after the game they entertained the crowd to an exhibition of hurling the boomerang, throwing the assegai and javelin, a performance which greatly interested the spectators who came from far and near. In May 1876 there is a record of the United South Including W. G. Grace and his brother E. F. Grace, also having played 22 of Bootle and District, a game which the locals won.

The Club moved to it's present site in 1884, and considerable expense was incurred in laying out the ground and building a pavilion, but the cost was guaranteed by several well-known local gentlemen and with a bazaar held in the Town Hall the deficit was cleared.

### **SEASON 1950**

A report of the match vs Neston played on 10th July 1950. was published in the Liverpool Daily Post It is headed "By our Cricket Correspondent" So I don't know who wrote it. But It's so good . It deserves an airing.

### **BOOTLE WERE WILLED INTO VICTORY**

"In the Middle of that academic part of Bootle were Oxford and Cambridge arbitrarily mingle lies the Bootle cricket ground, sandwiched between Balliol Road and Wadham Road. It was not on Saturday evening, a place of scholarly detachment. Bootle, with five wickets down and an hour to go needed 114 runs to beat Neston, and the crowd had no time for anaemic chivalry. Every run was applauded each Neston mis-fielding cheered and the Bootle team willed into victory by 5 minutes.

The afternoon began in quietness. Vickery , who opened with Little for Neston, sent for a new bat after the first over— an extravagance which was quickly punished for Shepherd, stooping casually as though to tie a bootlace, snapped up a snick to the slips off Young.

### **AN APPETISER**

Untroubled by this professional daftness. Stillman hit three boundaries as an appetiser in a grand innings., then Little who always plays so confidently that his dismissal always seem a fluke was lbw and Neston were 33 for 2.

By this time the ground was nearly full and the non paying side of Wadham Road was packed. Indeed to look at the faces poking through the railings was to realise how Bruman must feel on August Bank Holiday.

Cricket in Bootle seems a pursuit for men only, hard —headed men in dark suits who relegate most of their womenfolk to the home. Entrenched on the park side, behind concrete barriers of the kind that protect footballers they clap each maiden with precision., the shouting does not start until Bootle bat.

On the other side of the hedge sober games of bowls occur, but there were sounds on Saturday of children swinging themselves into bruises in the playground beyond.

There was also excitement on the ground as Stillman completed his 50 and went racing on mainly on the lines recommended by Walters the old Oxford coach, whose tuition was limited to the four words "It it and, Sir"

But Stillman did mor than hit hard, he chose the right balls to hit, and smothered the wrong ones. Mere hitting would not have been successful against the guile of Hool and the accuracy of Young, who finally bowled Stillman with an excellently flighted ball when the batsmen needing three for his century. Was for once Susceptible to temptation. Neston finished on 214 all out

### **OVER-RIPE BOWLING**

Bootle began their innings well helped by some fast but over-ripe bowling from Neston. Cohen early made two lovely square cuts for 4, allowing the bowler to do most of the work for him. Shepherd hopped down the wicket to bang some sumptuous full tosses to the boundary and was then bowled by Little, who unexpectedly released a shorter one.

At half-past six, Bootle were 70 for 3 Cohen was out caught in the slips for 37 by Vickery, who trapped the ball between his knees. Bootle lashed out and the applause became more and more partisan. A fielding error would transform a mediocre single into a brilliant 4 and appeals for lbw were derided by those least well placed to see.

Bootle were left with 28 to get in 15 minutes, and the ground as noisy as a swimming-bath full of schoolboys. Four leg-byes set up a new pinnacle of cheering, and a mid-wicket conference by Neston was asked to hurry it's agenda. Jones drove Long-Innes straight for 4 young did the same, the winning single came, and an old man arrested for whole minutes in the filling of his pipe, delved in his pouch like one whose dreams had come true.


Bootle went into the last day of the season in second place. One point behind Ormskirk. The last match of the season vs Oxton must have been quite exciting. Bootle batted first and were bowled out for 129 at the close Oxton were 129 for 8. match drawn 1 point. Hightown and Ormskirk shared the title.

There were a couple of notable matches during the season: The first against Wallasey at The Oval, Bootle only scored 91, but in a low scoring game we bowled them out for 57. Ken Young 6 for 21 including a hat trick.

We were second in the League when we had to play the top team Ormskirk at Wadham Road on the 21st June The Bootle players were jubilant at tea as they had bowled Ormskirk out for 58. Ken Young 6 for 20, Sid Shepherd 4 for 19. But it all changed from then on as Ormskirk bowled us out, for 34. This was our lowest score in the Liverpool Competition., and the lowest since 1929 when Wallasey bowled us out for 37.

Ken Ingham was our leading run scorer this season with 554 runs He was also the top match scorer with 86 not out against Huyton at Wadham Road. No one scored a century.

Ken Young was top wicket taker with 68 wickets. His best match 7 for 36 at High-

During his speech Mr Roberts pointed out that the Bootle Club was composed almost solely of Bootle born boys.

The Mayor in his speech said: "That for 125 years the club had been ambassadors for Bootle. The great traditions of England had been built on the village green . There was a spirit among the cricketing fraternity which was not found in any other game".

He went on to say: "That the Town Hall appears to be tottering and I'm afraid that the Cricket Club's annual ball will have to be held somewhere else."



# IN RETIREMENT By HARRY BROWN

When I used to sing lustily "Forty Years On," the local Grammar School Song, little did I think at that time it would apply to my cricket career.

I played my first match for the club in 1910 and my last competition match in 1950. What memories have I over a playing career of forty years? Certainly no regrets, and I am sincerely sorry that the period has just finished and not just started. If I could still bend quickly and if my legs did not get so tired, I would have carried on longer



My experience has been that of all the games I have played, there is none that can approach cricket as the ideal game from all points of view. It is a game that brings friendships, and I have played in many tours in different parts of the country, I always find it a great pleasure to go away, as I am certain to meet friends in practically every place.


How does the present compare with the past? In my young days we had not as many diversions, and I think we were inclined to play harder and practise more. It was certainly harder for a young player to make progress, and I well remember when I was in the 3rd XI, how I tried to move up into the 2nd team. I happened to do well in the latter and I remember the Captain saying to me at the end of one season, when I enjoyed a batting average of about 35: "Well Harry if you keep on like this you might get into the 1st eleven in three years' time." To-day, I think the youngsters obtain a better chance, and particularly in the Bootle Club, for a boy only has to show promise and he will be promoted quickly. Whether that is good or bad, I think depends on the temperament of the player in question.

What about the spectators? In my view, although at times a bit boisterous, the Bootle people have always been very fair to both the home team and the visitors; in fact, one of the greatest ovations I have heard on the ground was given to a visitor who had fielded magnificently. They always appreciated good fielding, and Bootle have nearly always had a good fielding side. When I was a reasonably good fielder, I always expected "the bird" when I erred, but as I grew older and my fielding deteriorated, they were rather harder on me.

I wish more people would join the club as Honorary Members, for we have a great tradition to keep up. We are the oldest club in the district, and have always kept the name of the borough to the fore in the sporting world. The club has a lot to offer, not only in the game itself, but from the social side.

I have finished playing competitive cricket and, as I have had so much out of the game, It is my intention to help those who are following me to the best of my ability.

The Memorial stone to commemorate those members who lost their lives in the 2nd world war was unveiled by club president Colin A.W. Roberts O.B.E. on Saturday 19th May before the home match against Wallasey. When the old pavilion was demolished in 2002 the stone was preserved and is now in the new pavilion entrance.

# SEASON SUMMERY 1956 LEAGUE CHAMPIONS

This was our 3rd Championship since the Competition fixtures were standardised in 1949. Ken Young scored the most runs 517 and took the most wickets. He also scored the only century exactly a 100 against Huyton at Wadham Road. 49 wickets included a 5 wicket haul on 4 occasions.

Sid Shepherd not for the first time had the best bowling figures 6 for 30, also against Huyton at Huyton Lane.

### **MEMORIAL CUP**

From 1943 there was a 20 over knock out. Up until 1956 details are scarce. I know Bootle won it at least once. Although I'm not sure which year. This must have been one of the first 20 over knockout competitions in the country. Scores in 20 overs at this time were mostly under a hundred.

Unfortunately we lost in the first round to Sefton at Sefton Park. We scored 67-7 off our 20 overs they scored 69-7 off 19.2 overs. Ron Parry must have been Bootle's man of the match, he top scored with 16 and took 3 wickets for 14.

### FROM THE PAST

### Minute Book 22 April 1918

Agreed that Mrs Walker be paid 2/6 (12½p) for washing up and attending to the kitchen on match days. (very generous) She was given 10/- (50p) for painting the chairs and posts on the ground.

A Mr A Coleman was elected as a member. His Address was given as 'Jawbone' Litherland Road.

### 29 April 1918

It was reported to the committee that a member Mr Harold Cain had been killed in action. Harrold served in the 10th Battalion The King's (Liverpool Regiment. He was 33 years old. He has no known grave, but is commemorated on the memorial at Loos in France. His Brother Ben died of his wounds on Christmas Day 1915. Both are commemorated on the memorial in the club. The committee stood for a minutes silence.

Mr F C Johnson was thanked for his generous donation of 10/- to club funds. (*That's sorted Mrs Walker out.*) She also got a rise of 1/- on match days to 3/6 (17½P)

### 15 July 1918

### **SEASON 1951**



### **SIR LEARY CONSTANTINE**



Was a Trinidadian Cricketer, Lawyer and Politician who, came to the UK during the 2nd world War along with a contingent of West Indians to work in a War Factory. They were always made welcome. And played matches for and against Bootle. Sir Leary was a very popular player at Wadham Road and people came from all over Merseyside and beyond to see him play. He went on to captain the West Indies test side. And was one of the 1st commentators on cricket on TV. He was Britian's first black peer.



### Sidney G Shepherd 1937 -1967 Captain: 1953 – 1956, 1958 and 1964

Sid Shepherd Joined the club as a professional in 1937. In those days the professional did not get changed in the same dressing room as the amateur players. He once told me he got changed in what was the Gents toilet in the old club. This arrangement only lasted a couple of seasons. He was Captain when we were Champions in 1956.

Sid was probably one of the best bowlers the club has ever had. If not the best. The stats here are only from 1942. We have no details of the 5 years prior to this. He took 1,115 wickets. We know he took all 10 wickets at Northern sometime between 1937 and 1941, he also took 9 for 41 against Sefton in Sefton Park September 1947. And 5 wickets or over in a match 67 times. He scored 4,345 runs in 406 Innings. His best being 103 vs Ormskirk in June 1944.

### **BOOTLE IN DANGER**

Bootle Cricket Club, which was formed 121 years ago and is one of the oldest on Merseyside— they had fixtures with the first Australian team to tour this country in 1868— is in grave danger of having to wind up it's affairs unless better financial support is forthcoming.

This was the blunt warning given to members by the president Mr. C A.W. Roberts at last nights annual meeting (writes H A Wolfe), If the people of Bootle wanted good cricket and to retain the public Spirit for which the town was famous, said Mr Roberts , they would have to come forward with financial help. Danger lay ahead unless the club had the backing of the industrialists and newcomers to Bootle in membership and subscription.

The accounts showed that despite economies in expenditure there was a los of £91 on last seasons workings, as compared with £81 in 1952.

A few of my happiest memories are getting all ten wickets against Northern and—although this may surprise a few! - scoring a hundred against Ormskirk, and once topping the batting averages. Following this, I had, like every other bowler, my dreams of the season to come, but I was soon brought to earth when, on inspecting the batting for the first match of the following season, I found that due to Albert Cohen being Captain. I was once again No. 11.

As space is limited, I am not allowed to ramble further. Perhaps when I retire, I may be allowed to come into print again, as one could fill many pages of events connected to Bootle Cricket Club, for making my years, both as a professional and amateur, such happy ones

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
